Key Building Blocks for Your Outdoor Centerpiece



As a centerpiece for outdoor living, an attractive pool area can provide a great getaway spot without ever having to get away. It can be a life-enhancing investment in family fun, in personal rejuvenation and in entertaining friends. In this article we want to talk a bit about the kinds of inground pools you can build and some of the amenities that can make a pool a great social and personal gathering space.

Three kinds of inground pools

1. Concrete pools



Concrete pools are the most time consuming and expensive to build, but they are also the most customizable and offer the greatest latitude for creating a distinctive shape that fits with the surrounding landscape and architecture. They can be any shape, size and depth and can include such things as vanishing edges, beach entries, and tanning ledges. The concrete is sprayed into a rebar grid and then covered in plaster that can be tinted almost any color. Tile can also be used to cover the concrete. This is a more costly option, but makes maintenance

easier because the smooth surface doesn't allow algae to stick and grow.

Concrete pools can be built in most environments. A typical pool can usually be completed in six to 12 weeks and cost anywhere from \$30,000 to \$50,000. The extent of the size and custom details will, of course, increase costs and construction time. Such pools also often need to be renovated every 10 to 20 years.

2. Fiberglass pools

Fiberglass pools are delivered as a complete shell made in a factory and can come with a number of options, including infinity edges, perimeter overflows, ceramic tile, mosaics and custom jets, among other features. Fiberglass pools have a smooth, nonporous surface, which repels algae and other contaminants, reducing the need for chemicals and maintenance time. In fact, fiberglass pools have little or no lifetime maintenance costs, with no resurfacing or vinyl liner to replace. However, as it must be transported as a complete unit and then lowered in with a crane, there are size limitations.

Fiberglass pools can often be quickly

installed in a few days, or a few weeks at the most. They generally cost in the \$20,000 to \$40,000 range.

3. Vinyl pools

Vinyl pools usually offer the least expensive option with the greatest flexibility. Advanced vinyl material has made it easier to create pools of all shapes and styles. The number of patterns and colors is almost endless. It can provide features like waterfalls and many distinctive looks for almost any theme desired. The vinyl is also smooth enough to prevent algae growth and reduce maintenance in that regard.

Over time, sun and chemicals will deteriorate the vinyl and it will need to be replaced. It is also more susceptible to damage than the other kinds of pools. With proper care it can last 10 to 15 years. However, pool owners also like the idea of being able to change the vinyl from time to time for a completely new look.

The vinyl flexes with temperature changes and is good in any climate. Vinyl pools can usually be installed in a few weeks, with most costing in the \$30,000 to \$35,000 range.
